



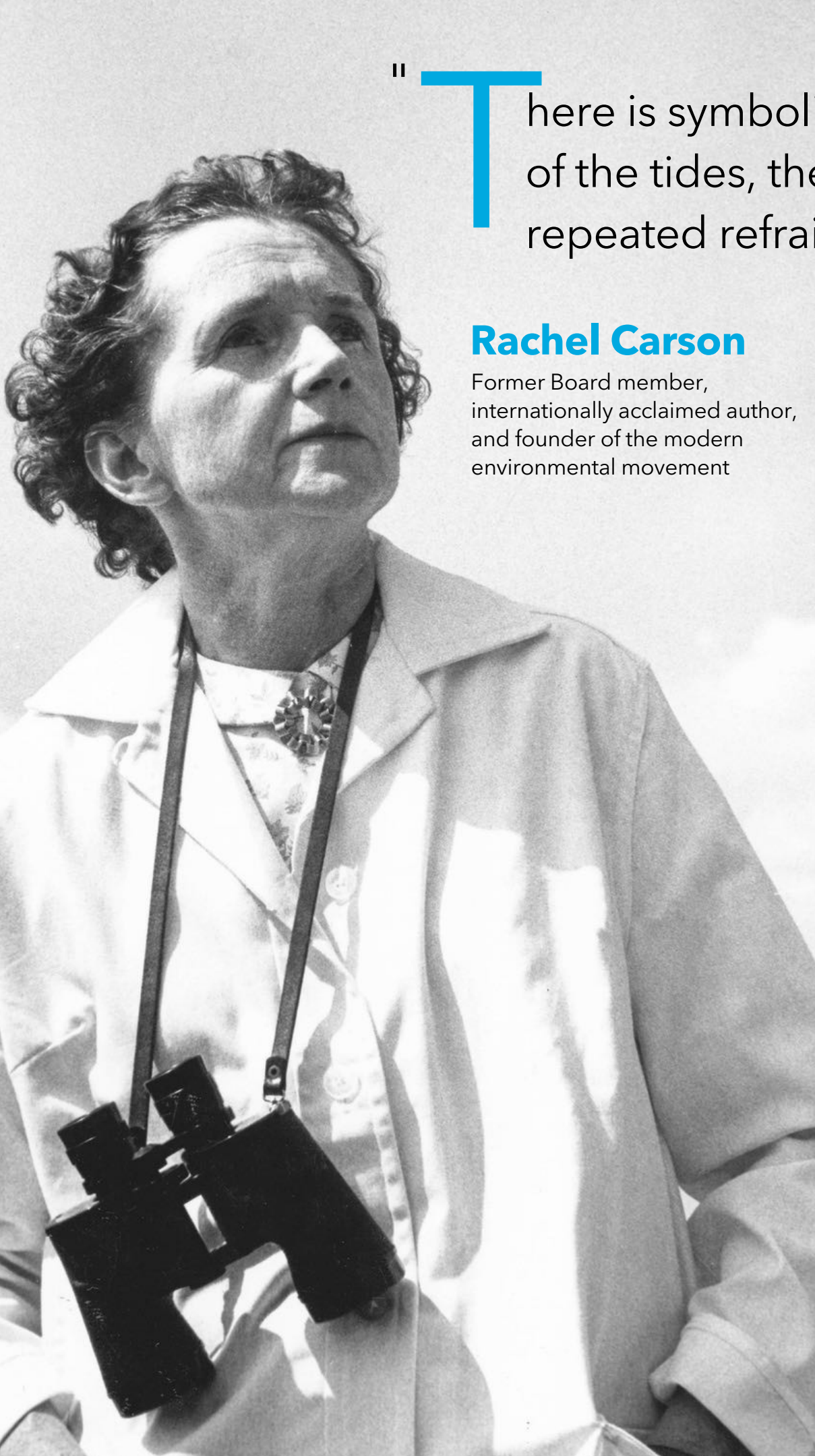

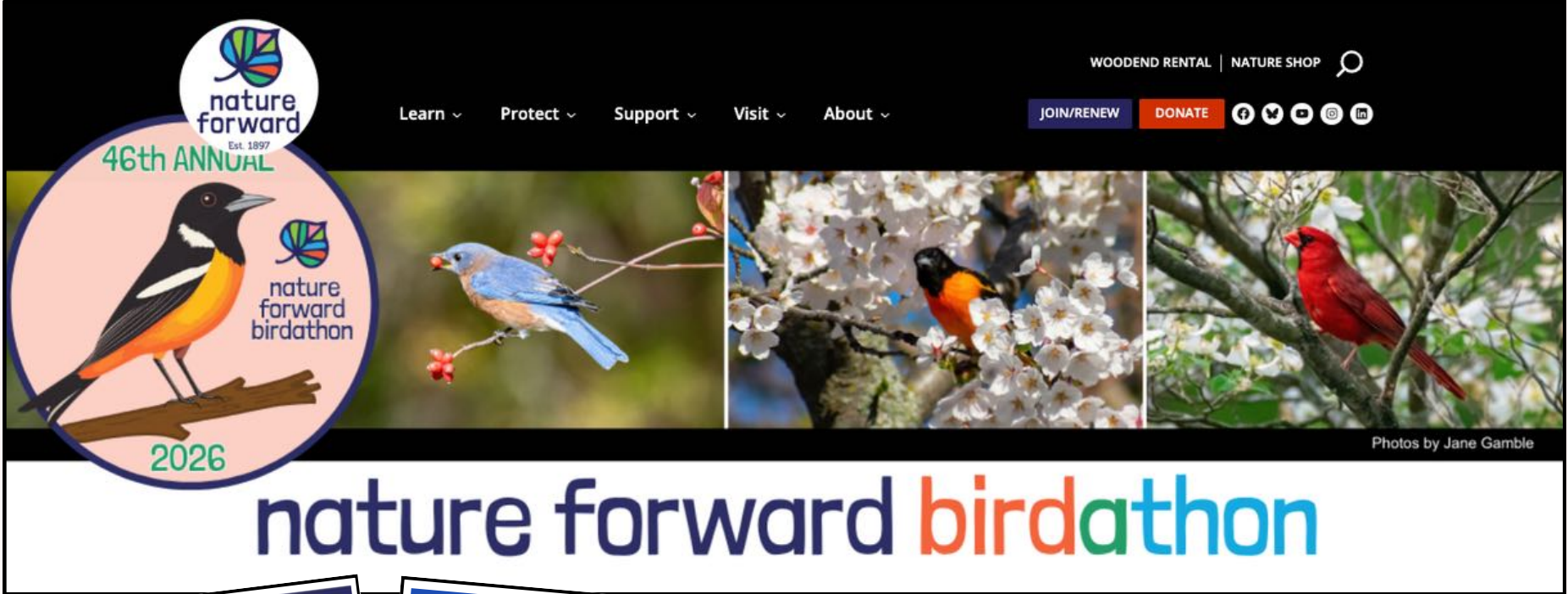

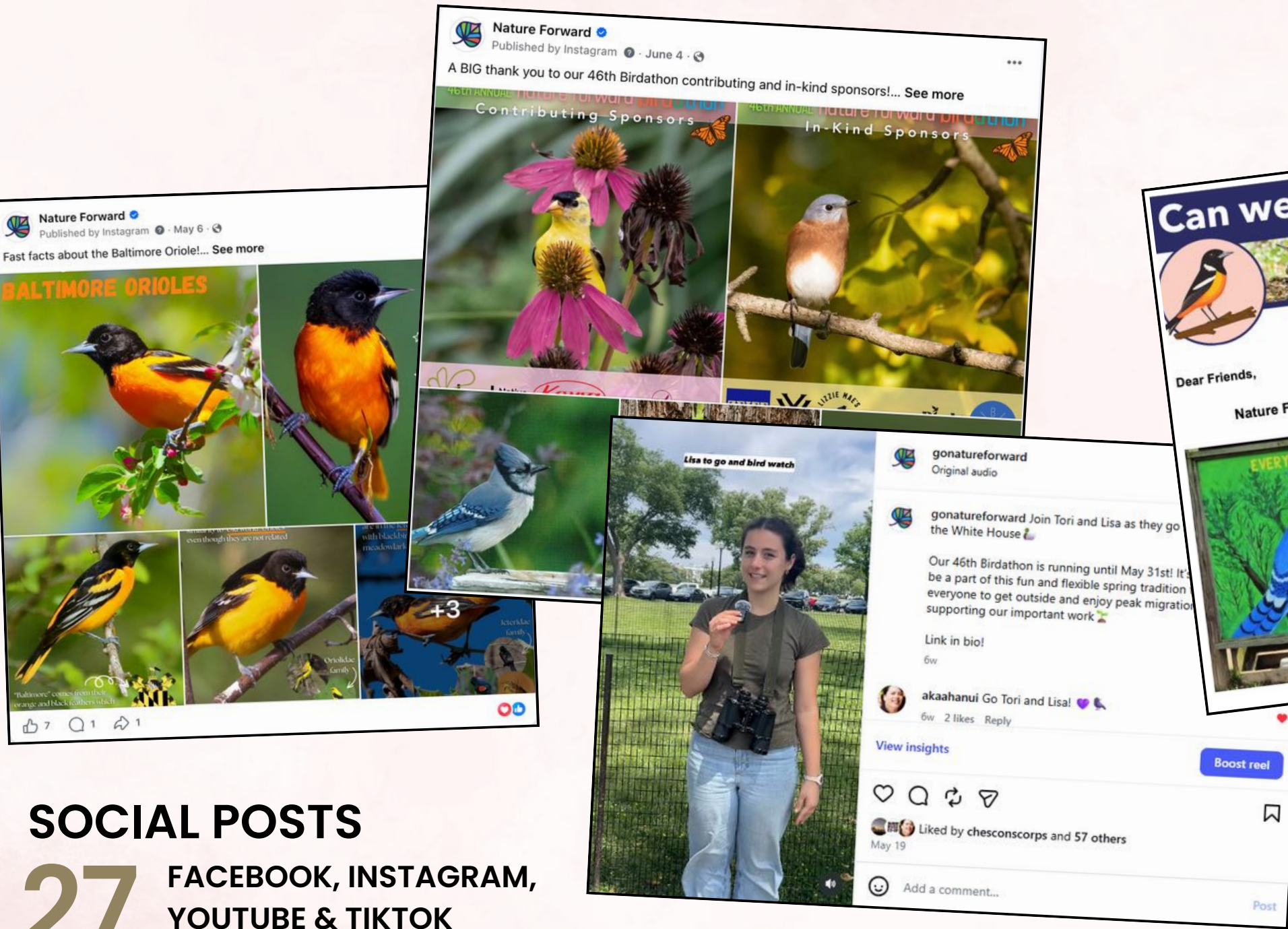
Nature Forward Birdathon: REACH

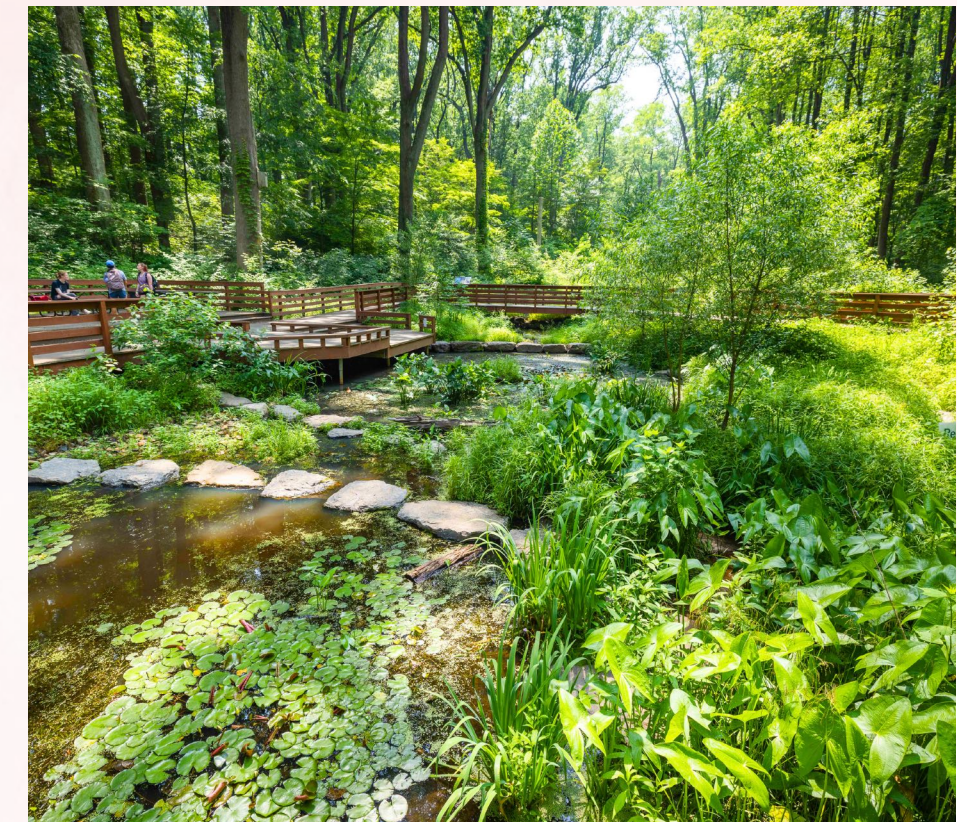
